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The Key Three: Concerning Gun Bill Removed from Consideration, Tax Increases Introduced, Lee Administration Workers' Compensation Bill

Concerning Gun Bill Removed from Consideration:

SB1037(Stevens)/HB746(Barrett) would remove the authorization for an individual, business, or local, state, or federal government entity to prohibit the possession of weapons by a person who is at a meeting conducted by or on property owned, operated, or managed or under the control of the individual, business, or government entity. In other words, this legislation would no longer allow a business to exercise their personal property rights when it comes to prohibiting firearms at their business. The bill also would remove the criminal offense of possession of a weapon in a building or on property that is properly posted. The Chamber and business community believe businesses need the right to control their personal property and be able to post any restrictions that they believe is best for their business. Some businesses have certain hazardous materials onsite and are required to prohibit firearms for safety purposes by federal and state occupational health standards.

The legislation was first introduced in 2023 and the sponsor decided to defer the legislation to the 2024 session after hearing many concerns. The Chamber and members of the business community met with the sponsor again this year and he agreed to take the bill off notice. Therefore the bill will not move froward this legislative session.

Two Major Business Tax Hikes Introduced:

Freshman Representative Aftyn Behn (D-Nashville) and Senator Charlane Oliver (D-Nashville) have introduced two bills that are deeply problematic for business. The first, <u>HB</u> 2234(Behn)/SB 2065(Oliver), would create a "new data transaction privilege tax" of 9.5% imposed on annual gross revenues "derived from data transactions from digital advertising services in the state." Revenue from the new tax would be used to fund a universal pre-K program. Regardless of the merits of creating universal pre-K education in Tennessee, the bill's new tax would be a massive burden on business and cost the state jobs.

The second bill, <u>HB 2043(Behn)/SB1934(Oliver)</u>, creates a new Business Enterprise Tax of 0.75% of a business' taxable enterprise tax base and makes the entire worldwide net earnings of a business subject to apportionment for tax purposes. Enactment of this new tax on business would pay for the elimination of the state's grocery tax. Like the first bill, this proposal would raise the cost of doing business in Tennessee.

Workers' Compensation Administration Bill:


<u>SB2094(Johnson)/HB1694(Lamberth)</u> initiated by the Bureau of Workers' Compensation (BWC) makes various changes to workers' compensation statute. The bill does four things. First, makes uniform a 14-days for electronic filling purposes for filing the First Report of

Injury FROI electronically with BWC. Second, this will result in a deletion of Notice of Controversy form since it no longer exists in paper format. Third, the bill clarifies that uninsured employer penalties may apply to construction and non-construction. Lastly, the Bureau of Workers Compensation seeks to extend the sunset of PC 189 (2021) for 5 years to July 2029, to continue to enforce worker's compensation insurance coverage laws. The legislation passed out of the Banking & Consumer Affairs Subcommittee and is currently placed on the Commerce Committee calendar for Tuesday, February 6 at 9 AM. The Chamber met with the Bureau of Workers' Compensation on this legislation and is supportive of the bill.
